Wonderful historical fiction about the eleven day disappearance of Agatha Christie.


## Ties That Tether by Jane Igharo

Fun retelling of Jane Eyre with twisty suspense thrown in.


## This is your Time by Ruby Bridges


#### The Diplomat's Wife by Pam Jenoff

### Don't Make me Turn this Life Around by Camille Pagan

Camille Pagan never disappoints. She crafts stories with the most believable and imperfect heroines as she crafts a course through life. In her newest novel Libby comes to grips with surviving melanoma while dealing with motherhood and marital insecurity. Libby's answer: a family trip- and that's when the novel really takes flight!

#### In a Book Club Far Away by Tif Marcelo

A heartwarming book about military wives that bond over a book club. Filled with the messiness of real life, this book is an ode to the power of friendship.

## **Instructions for Dancing** by Nicola Yoone

To quote the title of Yoone's previous book, this one was "Everything, EVERYTHING". I adore Yoone's writing style; I'm always rooting for her characters 100%, and sigh when I get to the last page. It was enchanting, heartbreaking, and hopeful.

Malibu Rising by Taylor Jenkins Reid

A hard-edged story of 80's Hollywood and one Bacchanal party that is out of control. At the end of this novel, everything is up in flames. Reid writes these gripping Hollywood stories that are so over-the-top and dramatic they feel so real.

#### The Invisible Husband of Frick Island by Coleen Oakley

A charming book that gave me all the feels. A grieving widow continues to talk and act as though her husband were still living. The whole town cooperates to help her in her time of grief.

This book is wildly imaginative with a positive message.

### The Most Beautiful Girl in Cuba by Chanel Cleeton

Historical fiction about Cuba's Evangilina Cisneros and two other revolutionary women during the Cuban War for Independence from Spain. Her story is entwined with the Americans; Hearst and Pulitzer newsmen trying to garner "the Scoop", and Grace who manages to speak for Cuban women in a way the men could not.

## The Other Black Girl by Zakiya Dalila Harris

Interesting take on what it means to be the ONLY Black female at a publishing house and what happens when another Black woman appears. The plot twists were at times bizarre. However, the book explores the "Only" syndrome, code switching, microaggressions, and more.

#### The Plot by Jean Hanff Korelitz

Did he or didn't he steal the plot to a novel that made a writer famous? That's the premise to this twisty suspense novel. The beginning of the book drags as it works to establish the main character as a literary writer and then it picks up, moving along like a speeding train. I guessed the twist, and I'm still trying to decide whether or not that was intentional by the author: that the reader is more clued in than the protagonist. Still, it's a really good read.

#### Summer on the Bluffs by Sunny Hostin

A perfect summer read. Totally indulgent, I devoured it in a day. This book follows the Black elite on Martha's vineyard. Three women brought together by their godmother, sprinkle in secrets, decadent lifestyles and you have one hell of a ride. I loved it!

I was hooked on the premise that the matriarch used to belong to a "scandalous" or "trashy" book club back in the day that read Jackie Collins, Judith Krantz and the like. I remember those books fondly, and that

made this story even more enjoyable. I loved the aspect of pairing wine and cheese with the books. This book is pure summer bliss.

#### Local Woman Missing by Mary Kubica

Twisty page turner. A cold case where three women disappear and only one comes back eleven years later. Brilliant!

#### Pack Up the Moon by Kristan Higgins

This is a beautiful story of love, loss, and grief. Anyone who has lost a loved one will relate to many facets of love shown between Josh and Lauren. It is a very emotional book and might trigger some readers, but any tears shed will be worth it.

#### The Break-Up Book Club by Wendy Was

## Arsenic and Adobo by Mia P. Mansala

Charming cozy mystery filled with a lovable heroine, aunties, and a great cast of Filipino characters. The Filipino dishes described throughout the book made my mouth water. Definitely planning on making some of the desserts-- I look forward to reading the next book in the series.

### Family for Beginners by Sarah Morgan

Heartwarming story of a young woman who longs for a family and a widower with two children mourning for their mother. The ending brought tears to my eyes.

#### Isn't it Bromantic by Lyssa Kay Adams

I'm so glad Vlad's story was finally told. This book is funny, sweet, and charming. It's everything I've come to expect and enjoy from this series. I loved it.

Seven Perfect Things by Catherine Ryan Hyde

This warm and fuzzy book is perfect to make you remember that there's goodness in the world. Seven puppies rescued by a thirteen year-old girl are the catalyst for this novel. The dogs change her life, her abused mother's life, and the kind stranger who helps them.

#### **Sisters in Arms** by Kaia Alderson

Finally. A book about World War II that highlights the contributions of Black women. This book is based on a true story of the 6888 central-postal battalion. I was pretty much done with WWII books and then this beauty of a novel came out. This tells the story of two women selected by Dr. Mary McCleod Bethune to become the recruits in the all-black WAC. This story is told with humor, and the uncomfortable but all-too-real truth of racism and sexism they faced in order to serve their country. There's so much to say about this book—it's heartwarming and confirms the power of women; I love it.

## The Final Revival of Opal and Nev by Dawnie Walton

This is being compared heavily to "Daisy Jones and the Six". The documentary/reporter narrative style about a rock band is similar, but that's where it ends for me. This was really a story about the racial inequality of music in the sixties, feminism, and finding ways to belong. Where Daisy Jones felt like the interview of a real band, this read more like a well-written story. I have to say Walton's description of Opal had me picturing the legendary Grace Jones the entire book. My only complaint was the ending footnotes needed to be the end of the story and not the footnotes.

#### The Personal Librarian by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray

A fascinating look at the life of Belle de Costa Green, the personal librarian of J.P. Morgan. It was her mother's decision to pass off the children as white and this defining factor shaped Belle's life. Belle, living her life as a white woman, becomes one of the most famous - if unknown at the time-- black women of the literary world. My favorite passage from the book, "one day, Belle, we will be able to reach back through the decades and claim you as one of our own. Your accomplishments will be part of history..." Having visited the Morgan library, I am eager to go back armed with the new information about Belle. This is what I love most about historical fiction: bringing new things to light. I usually never read author's notes and was so glad I did in this instance as it showed the depth of research and friendship that helped bring this novel together.

### The Scandal by Nicola Marsh

Completely engrossing, twisty mystery involving three friends, one dead pregnant woman, and a host of lying husbands. Loved the ending.

## Three Words for Goodbye by Hazel Gaynor and Heather Webb

I love when these two authors team up. In their latest novel two squabbling sisters come together to fulfill their grandmother's dying wish to visit Europe and deliver three letters - one in

Paris - *au revoir*- Venice -*arrivederci* - and Austria - *auf wiederschen*. Set against a backdrop of pre-WW2 in 1937 and with the inspiration of their Aunt Nellie (Nellie Bly) these two sisters learn about themselves, their heritage, and their future. I loved it.

### While We Were Dating by Jasmine Guillory

Jasmine Guillory is the gold standard in writing believable and lovable romance books/series. Her latest book in the Wedding Date series doesn't disappoint. I especially love the timeliness of the issues, coupled with the resolve, and a Happily Ever After that made me swoon. Beautiful.

#### Seven Days in June by Tia Williams

This book is heart wrenchingly beautiful. I love the characters, the drama, the angst, the pull and the push. The writing is pure poetry. I got to the last page and sighed. An exceptional novel - probably my book of the year.

### The Last Chance Library by Freya Sampson

Charming story of an introverted para-librarian trying to save her small town library. This book is a lovely reminder of why libraries are so important and the backbone of the community.

#### The Seven Day Switch by Kelly Harms

Fun "Freaky Friday", "Parent trap", "Wife-swap" mashup of a book. Two suburban moms who think the grass is greener wake up in each other's bodies after drinking sangria with artisanal infused vodka. Often hilarious, and at other times a sad commentary on the state of how women treat each other.

#### The Sweetest Remedy by Jane Igharo

Wonderful novel on identity and love in the time of loss. Hannah travels to Nigeria for the funeral of a father she never knew and meets a family who is unprepared for her existence. This story is all about what it means to be a family and how we identify ourselves. I loved it.

#### The Woman at the Front Lecia Cornwall

Compelling WWI saga of a young woman's fight to practice medicine as a doctor. Not until she is sent to war-torn France as a glorified nursemaid to an entitled aristocrat does she come into her own. Eleanor grows into herself as she sheds her naivety, becomes Doctor Atherton and gains respect along the way.

### We are Not Like Them by Christine Pride and Jo Piazza

A powerful novel about best friends, one Black and one white whose lives are permanently changed by the killing of a Black teen. The prose is so compelling as it is told in the alternating points of Jen and Riley. The reader bears witness to their friendship and their pain as race becomes a factor of their friendship like never before. An extraordinary read, perfect for today's climate.
