Dava Shastri's Last Day by Kirthana Ramisetti

What if you knew you were dying, so you had your death announced so you could hear what was being said about you? That's the premise of this thoughtful novel. Dava faces her mortality with one less weekend with her children. Secrets are revealed and uncomfortable truths are

spoken. This story about a mother's unyielding love for family and her legacy makes this book unforgettable.

Heart and Seoul by Jen Frederick

A Korean woman who is adopted returns to Korea to find her biological parents. She discovers her own self worth and finds romance along the way while searching for her biological roots. My only criticism is that the beginning is a little slow. And the publishing company's marketing team was wrong to even try to classify this as a romance novel. It feels more like a K-drama. It is a good book, but straight up women's fiction.

Honor by Thrity Umrigar

Honor, by definition: "Honesty, fairness, or integrity in one's beliefs and actions". This word is twisted to convey the ugliness of humanity disguised as upholding piety and tradition. This book is a thoughtful look at what happens when a young Indian woman, Meena, is set on fire because of the ugly tradition of honor. Seen through the eyes of the Indian-American journalist who is covering the story and the phoenix rising in the birth of her child, Abru, who's name means "honor". Brilliant and thought provoking: I loved it.

Last Girl Ghosted by Lisa Unger

Dark and twisty, this book had me on the edge of my seat!

The Fastest Way to Fall by Denise Williams

Fitness coach and a woman blogging her fitness journey make for an absolutely charming romance.

The Last Dance of the Debutante by Julia Kelly

Charming look on the last debutante season. A little campy with the over-the-top drama, but that's why I loved it. It had a true old-timey soap opera "Peyton Place" vibe.

The School for Good Mothers by Jessamine Chan

Chilling story of a mother who one fateful morning neglects her daughter and is mandated to a school to learn how to be a good mother. So much to unpack in this novel with a commentary on how mothers of color are judged more harshly in the court system than white women.

The Reading List by Sara Nisha Adams

Black Girls Must Be Magic by Jayne Allen

Sequel to "Black Girls Must Be Exhausted" continues Tabby's search for self. As Tabby continues to struggle with the loss of her grandmother, she is faced with pregnancy, man issues, and her career as a Black newscaster. This one felt a little like a telenovela, but it's still a great read.

Finlay Donovan Knocks 'Em Dead by Elle Cosimano

Finley Donovan is back! As always, her life is a hot mess. She needs to be writing her next mystery book, but instead, she's once again involved in a real life mystery. Someone wants her ex-husband dead. Finley, and her sidekick Vero are the amateur sleuth version of Lucy and Ethel. Fun read!

Heiress Apparently by Diana Ma

A young Chinese-American actress travels to Beijing and finds family she never knew existed.

As she learns more about her family's past, she discovers her own self worth.

Lace by Shirley Conran

A Jamie Brenner Throwback Thursday Book Club pick: not sure this could have been written today as it contains every trope under the sun. 740 pages too long, but still a fun read--if not by modern standards.

Olga Dies Dreaming by Xochitl Gonzalex

The chase for the American Dream as seen through Puerto Rican wedding planner Olga and her congressman brother Pietro. The story is filled with long-held family secrets that chase the identity seeking siblings. A quiet novel with a lot to unpack on racism, sexism, and homophobia.

Reminders of Him by Colleen Hoover

Haunting story of a young woman looking for redemption from sins of her past. Hoover's writing makes you ache for her and root for her all at the same time.

The Family You Make by Jill Shavis

A woman longing for family facing possible death agrees to fake a relationship. This sweet romance brings out all the feels.

The Magnolia Palace by Fiona Davis

Fiona Davis is one of my favorite historical fiction authors. She crafts seamless stories of dueling timelines. She does not disappoint in this book, going between 1919 and 1966. This is a story of stolen identities, stolen jewelry, stolen affections, stolen allegiances, and ultimately, the restored history of what happened at Frick mansion. I loved it.

The Maid by Nita Prose

Charming mystery. Molly is a maid at an exclusive hotel who unwittingly becomes a suspect when she discovers a body in a hotel room. While Molly is never identified as neurodivergent, that is the assumption given to the readers as to her being unaware of the mess she's in. I loved it, but hated the final twist at the end--it didn't track with the rest of the novel.

The Paris Bookseller by Kerri Maher

Historical fiction about Paris Bookseller Sylvia Beach and her publication of James Joyce's book *Ulysses*. The book is well researched and documented. That is why I did not love this book, but liked it. I love Maher's writing and wish it were more infused in this story. I will say I learned a lot about the early days of publishing.

Violeta by Isabel Allende

This story is told through the eyes of Violeta, a hundred year old woman who was born in 1920 during the Spanish Flu and the end of her life in 2020 during the Corona pandemic. This tale is told in a way that many of our elders speak. The book often criss-crossed through time and meanders to make a point. At times, I was like "Get to the point already". Then I realized that

was the beauty of this novel. The reader feels like they are learning from the old, and the only way to do that is to listen and--in this case--read.

The Violin Conspiracy by Brendan Slocumb

Wow! A fast-paced mystery of an inherited violin that turns out to be a Stradivarius is stolen right before the Tchaikovsky competition. Ray, a black violinist, never felt that he belonged, except when he was playing--and now the violin is gone. There is so much story here, and so much to unpack and discuss. My favorite passage from the book "...Music is truly a universal language, and that we, the listeners, will always impose our own fears and biases, our own hopes and hungers, in whatever we hear." This book is extraordinary.

A Deadly Inside Scoop by Abby Collette

Cute cozy mystery, the first in a series in a family ice cream shop. This book set up the series with a cast of zany characters and red herrings to solve the mystery. The ice cream flavors sounded amazing. Looking forward to reading the next installment.

An Inconvenient Woman by Dominick Dunne

A Jamie Brenner Throwback Thursday Book Club pick. Wow; a voyeuristic look into the life of the rich and spoiled. This is a juicy book of a husband, his mistress, his wife, and the reporter who witnesses their exploits. Such a fun read!

Joan is Okay by Weike Wang

This is a quiet novel that explores an Asian doctor's life before the pandemic and right before the onset of 2020. With themes of isolation, assimilation, stoicism, and racism this book will resonate with readers on a very deep level. My only criticism is that there are no chapter breaks which, just like the pandemic, made this exhausting at times.

My Darling Husband by Kimberly Belle

This had me on edge. A twisty page turner on a home invasion. The story is told in timed increments through the eyes of the hostage-- wife Jade, the kidnapper-- Sebastian, the husband desperately trying to find money for the ransom, and the reporter-- Juanita, trying to make sense of the aftermath.

One Italian Summer by Rebecca Serle

Haunting novel about grief. When Katie's mother dies, she takes the trip to the Amalfi Coast on what was to have been a trip they took together. Overwhelmed with the loss of her mother, who was her best friend, she retraces her mother's steps of her time in Italy years ago. A poignant story with happy tears.

The Brilliant Life of Eudora Honeysett by Annie Lyons

A beautiful story of 85 year old Eudora who is alone in this world. She makes the decision to book a date with an assisted end-of-life clinic so she can leave this world on her own terms. Then she meets her adorable new neighbor, ten year-old Rose, and becomes involved in her life. Just when Eudora is ready to die is the moment she starts to live.

The Christie Affair by Nina de Gramont

Historical fiction account of the infamous Agatha Christie disappearance. This read more like fantastical fiction than historical fiction, as it was told from Archie Christie's mistress Nan's point of view. This felt off to me, as I didn't like the character Nan and didn't care about her point of view. As a result, I quickly became bored as I wanted more of Agatha's story as I sympathized more with her than Nan.

The Department of Rare Books and Special Collections by Eva Jurczyk

A rare book goes missing after the director has a stroke. It's up to Lieso, the interim director to find out where it is and what happened. Definitely a book for book lovers.

The Liz Taylor Ring by Brenda Janowitz

Lizzie idolized Elizabeth Taylor and imagines her love story to Ritchie to be just as glamorous as Liz Taylor and Richard Burton. So she's ill prepared for the marriage filled with the ups and down of being married to a gambler. When Ritchie presents Lizzie with an 11 carat ring reminiscent of the fabled Liz Taylor ring, it becomes the symbol of their marriage. This book is set in the past and present: their love story, and years later when their three children find out that the ring they'd thought was lost is found. I loved the author's note at the end that shares all the Easter eggs dropped in the novel about the real Liz and Dick love story.

The Love of My Life by Rosie Walsh

Deeply disturbing and utterly satisfying novel. This story is about what happens when a husband, Leo, finds out the woman he thought he married, Emma, is keeping secrets from him. When secrets are exposed, nothing is as it seems.

The Roughest Draft by Emily Wibberley and Austin Siegemund-Broka

Co-writers Catrina and Nathan are no longer speaking after their last best-selling book. They are forced to work together after four years to write the next contracted book. This story has such raw emotion and an intense slow burn that escalates with every turn of the page. The book pulled me in, and I sighed when I reached the last page. I loved it.

The Taste of Ginger by Mansi Shah

Beautiful story of an Indian-American woman who returns to India during a family crisis. She rediscovers parts of herself she lost when assimilating into the American culture.

You've Reached Sam by Dustin Thao

This book is hauntingly beautiful. It explores the "what if"-- what if you could talk to the one you love after they died? There is so much emotion in this book. I will be thinking about this book for a long time--I loved it.

Black Cake by Charmaine Wilkerson

A gorgeous novel. A mother leaves behind an audio confession for her children after her death about her true life story. This book seamlessly weaves the mother's harrowing start in life with the tumultuous lives of her adult children. This is a thoughtful and introspective novel that I will be thinking about for a long time. It did make me long for some black cake--I loved it.
